St Thomas the Apostle Holy Mass and Celebration

On the 1st July 2022 at 7pm, Father Dean Marin, Deacon Remo Patroni along with six concelebrating priests, celebrated the Feast of St Thomas the Apostle Holy Mass for the Adelaide Archdiocese and the Indian Catholic Community of Adelaide.

Since Christians in India form a very small minority, their faith and their rights being recognized in India and worldwide is extremely important. In 2021, the Feast of St Thomas (3rd July) was named as 'Indian Christian Day'The feast of St Thomas the Apostle is a significant event as it commemorates the arrival of the Christian faith in India, more than 2000 years ago.

Of equal importance to Indian Christians, the Pope recently canonised the first layman Saint for India. On the 5th June the Indian Community both in Indian and abroad were united in joy at the canonisation St Deva Sahayam; an 18th century Indian layman who converted to Catholicism from Hinduism, and who was killed in 1752 for refusing to refute his faith despite being brutally tortured. St Deva Sahayam comes from the southernmost tip of India, Kotta Diocese, also homeland to a few of our missionary priests serving in Adelaide.

This St Thomas Holy Mass saw all language groups of the Indian community work in unity to celebrate a beautiful Holy Mass where all communities participated and worshiped as one. Prayers, readings and hymns were heard in more than five different languages including the Eastern Rite Churches of Syro-Malabar and Syro-Malankara (Malayalam), as well as Latin Rite Churches (Konkani, Marathi, Tamil, Bengali, Hindi, Punjabi language groups).

Lithuanian Celebration

The Lithuanian Community celebrated Mindaugas' day - Lithuanian Statehood Day - on the 6th of July. Mindaugas united all the lands of Lithuanian in the 1230s and agreed to receive baptism as a Roman Catholic, while trying to stop brutal colonization campaigns by the Teutonic Order under the pretext of forcibly Christianising. This annual celebration commemorates the day when the first King Mindaugas was crowned in 1253 with the support of Pope Innocent the IV. However, Mindaugas's baptism had little impact on the majority of the population, people were not required to convert. The Christianisation of Lithuania only started in 1387 and finished in 1413. Lithuania was the last country in Europe to adopt Christianity.

Each year Lithuanians dress in national costumes and have a celebration on the day with traditional songs and dances, and a meal.





Feast of St Alphonsa

The Syro Malabar St Alphonsa Parish Community celebrated The Feast of St Alphonsa on the 31th of July, 2022. This annual celebration, the namesake of their Parish Community, is an important event, celebrating the Holy life of Saint Alphonsa, a Kerala Nun, who was the first woman saint for the Indian Church.










Scalabrian Father's Canonisation



Pope Francis has cleared the way for the canonisation of Blessed Giovanni Battista Scalabrini, founder of the Scalabrinian missionaries, dispensing the requirement of a miracle attributed to his intercession, the Vatican announced. Father Tomaz Ruiz CS, Parish Priest of Seaton and Chaplain to the Spanish Speaking and Albanian Communities attributes this to be 'the MIRACLE!'

Proclaimed as the "father of migrants" by St. John Paul II in 1998, Blessed Scalabrini founded the Missionaries of St. Charles Borromeo, commonly known as the Scalabrinian Fathers, and the Missionary Sisters of St. Charles in the late 19th century to minister to countless Europeans who migrated to North and South America. Since its founding, the Scalabrinians have continued their pastoral ministry "in 32 countries and on five continents," the congregation's website said. This includes South Africa, where they are actively helping migrants.



Celebrate Language

Incorporate the native languages of the members of your parish community in the celebration of Mass.

This can be done at the Prayers of the Faithful, or invite people to pray the Lord's Prayer in their first language. It can be messy, but so was the first Pentecost!

Collect the Stories of Your Community

Ask individuals and families both recent arrivals and longtime residents, to share their stories.

- Stories could be collected in written form, as a poster, powerpoint slides or as a video.
- Choose a time and place when these stories could be shared (e.g. a reflection after communion at Mass; at a gathering after Mass; hang posters in the Church foyer or other appropriate spaces.)

Break Bread Together

Host an international banquet and invite members of your community to bring a dish that represents their home country or culture.
