SACRAMENT OF BAPTISM

The Sacrament of Baptism is the most beautiful thing that happens in someone's life. When someone is baptised it means that God the Father, the Son, Jesus Christ and the Holy Spirit give the new Christian many very special gifts. To be baptised in the Catholic Church means more than being sprinkled with water on one's head and receiving a Christian name. As Father Timothy Radcliffe writes in his latest book *Take the Plunge*, "It is our sharing in Christ's victory over death, our lives are hidden in the risen Christ and we are taken up into the very life of God". (p1)

The word '*Baptism*' comes from a Greek word that means to '*plunge*' or '*immerse*'. To '*plunge*' someone in water represents the person dying, being buried and resurrecting with Christ as a '*new creature*.' (C.C.C. # 1214) Some call this Sacrament '*the washing of regeneration and renewal by the Holy Spirit*' because Baptism results in a new birth of water and the Spirit. Without it, no one can enter the Kingdom of God. [Jn. 3:5] (C.C.C. # 12)

The gift of Baptism: Baptism is something given, it is a grace. "Grace" is a gift of God to human beings. Baptism is the grace of new life with Christ: to live as he lived, to love as he loved. "As children of the font, we learn confidence in a love which is unshakeable. But as adults in Christ, we discover how it will turn our lives upside down and remake us." (Take the plunge p288)

This is how a five-year-old child understood the meaning of Baptism: "*Baptism is when Jesus is born in my heart*", and this is the basis. In fact he made the connections : Jesus (God made man) comes to live in us, to be born in our heart, where one loves him through Baptism. Baptism is at the same time our own birth in the life of God.

What is the importance of Baptism?: Christian baptism is one of two ordinances that Jesus instituted for the church. Jesus said, "Go and make disciples of all nations, baptising them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, and teaching them to obey everything I have commanded you. And surely I am with you always, to the very end of the age" (Matthew 28:19-20). These instructions specify the church's responsibility to teach and be Jesus' word, to make disciples, to welcome and to baptise those disciples.

Christian baptism has a deeper significance. It is to be done in the name of the Father, Son, and Spirit—this is what makes it "Christian" baptism. It is through this ordinance that a person is admitted into the fellowship of the church. When we are saved, we are "baptised" by the Spirit into the Body of Christ, which is the church. First Corinthians 12:13 says, "We were all baptised by one Spirit so as to form one body—whether Jews or Gentiles, slave or free—and we were all given the one Spirit to drink." Baptism by water is a "re-enactment" of the baptism by the Spirit. Christian baptism is the means by which a person makes a public profession of faith and discipleship.

What does Baptism mean?: If the meaning of baptism could be boiled down to one word, that word would be identification. Baptism speaks primarily of a personal, public identification with Jesus Christ. In Romans 6:3-4 the Apostle Paul puts the matter this way:



Don't you know that all of us who were baptised into Christ were baptised into his death? We were therefore buried with him through baptism into death in order that, just as Christ was raised from the dead through the glory of the Father, we too may live a new life.

Notice the strength of the expressions—"baptised into Christ" and "baptised into his death" and "buried with him in baptism." It means we have turned to a new life in Jesus Christ where we are publicly identifying with the death, burial and resurrection of Christ. It means we are openly joining those who believe in Christ.

When we are baptised, we are in fact visually preaching the gospel.

Fr TIMOTHY RADCLIFFE's 'gems' He was master of the Dominican Order and has numerous best selling books and has been awarded the Michael Ramsey prize for theological writing. He currently gives retreats, lectures and conference key– note addresses worldwide. In his latest book *'Take the Plunge'*, he encourages us to rediscover the beauty of baptism as it touches the inmost dramas of human life: birth, growing up, risking falling in love, searching for meaning, managing failure and suffering and death.


In his presentation, Fr Timothy cleverly took a parable and broke it open to relate it to everyday living. The Prodigal Son was used to tackle the generation gap and it being the biggest challenge faced by the church today. Accepting young people and challenging them back is to build unity and reconcile through speaking the truth. We are servants of grace and we shouldn't panic but have confidence in young people who will eventually come back. When they fall, help them up and encourage them to have another go!

The same applies to our families who bring their children to be baptised. They should feel "at home in the church". A home is a place where one can relax, feel free to speak and be oneself. The church should be humanity's home no matter what they have done. We are to be unconditional in our hospitality and befriend our families where they are at in their faith journey. Jesus was unconditional in all his friendships and he is our unconditional friend in our mess too! "We begin in our mess; we are the church".

Our faith is an incarnational faith and we are to be the Word of God. Baptism is the blessing of all our bodily existence and we truly become our self when we are conformed in Christ. Our role is to help our families enjoy their faith.

"Grace is God bursting into our lives" "Make people feel that God rejoices in them"

"Vocation is to be the person we are called to be" "Throw away your masks and be Christ like"



BAPTISM ACTIVITIES

- Make and decorate a card celebrating baptism
- Read the story of when Jesus was baptised
- Make a dove using cottonwool for the body to symbolise the event of Jesus's baptism
- Present a 'Godly Play' session on baptism
- Look at the different symbols of baptism and discuss their significance
- Discuss new life and where it can be seen. Draw them.
- Ask the children to bring in their own baptismal candle and share their story
- Make a poster showing the symbols of baptism
- Use a photo of their own baptism as the centre of a poster about baptism
- Have a role play of a baptism ceremony using a doll.
- Visit the church to see the baptismal font, oil and the paschal candle
- Draw a picture of the church's baptismal font
- Write a thank you card to their godparents
- Bring in their baptism certificate to share with the group
- Share a blessing with the group and bless each child with water
- Renew their baptismal promises and discuss the meaning of each one
- Use pop sticks to stick cut outs of John the Baptist and Jesus, have a small bowl of water and retell the story of the baptism of Jesus

MAKING CONNECTIONS

Connecting Families with Parish

On this page, we offer some ideas which Parishes could use to assist families to connect with the Sacrament of Baptism.

Being Welcoming and Inclusive

Use the regular Parish Mass and Parish morning tea once or twice a year or a luncheon/barbeque for

Family

- Welcoming new people to the parish
- For those who have had children baptized in the Parish (send invitations to those baptized that year)
- Send general invitation through the parish bulletin and the School newsletter to all families who have had children baptized or who are looking towards doing so

Talk again with the Parish about **the importance of our Baptism** and how through it we are all called to mission.

- How am I on Christ's mission within my parish boundaries to the churched and unchurched?
- How do I / can I connect with families in a welcoming and hospitable manner regularly?
- Am I accepting of others whatever their station in life at the moment, be it divorced, separated or feeling estranged from the Church?

As a Parish, group of parishes or deanery, is there a possibility of employing a skilled worker who can meet the needs of people who are challenged to approach the parish?



Our Baptism calls us to be

sign of God's love.

- Send a card to the child on either their birthday or their baptismal day until they reach school age (put a return address in case the family has moved).

(Can be sent by a member of the Parish who is less able to participate in other ways but would like to make a contribution)
- Invite the family to a Sunday Liturgy or to the next Family Mass where they can receive their child's baptismal certificate (especially on a Sunday when there is a morning tea to follow)
- If the family has school-aged children, invite them to the next Children's Liturgy of the Word within the Parish
- Invite the parents and/or godparents to speak with other parents who wish to baptize their child, of their own experience of their child's baptism (in a very simple informal manner) or invite them to meet other parents over a cuppa
- As part of the Baptism preparation, include ways in which parents can very simply nurture the faith of their child eg signing the cross on the child's forehead, reflecting upon the meaning of the baptismal water when bathing their child and pouring water over his/her head (Contact Sr Jenny Seal at this office if you would like further ideas)

MAKING CONNECTIONS

Connecting Families with each other

On this page, we offer some ideas which Parishes could create on a page or insert in their bulletin for families to recall with their children the gift of Baptism. In this way, we can assist families to nurture their children's faith through the sharing of activities .

- Recall your Baptism and that of your children
- Recollect the memories and share them together through photographs, certificates, gifts and the name and godparents chosen
- Discuss what happened that day, who was present and all the arrangements of the day
- Talk to your child/children about how you felt on the day
- Share how you can each live out in your lives, the gifts of faith, hope and love received at Baptism

God, help us to always remember how precious we are to you.

- With your children, make a list or a chart (family tree) of as many people as you can who belong to your own family. Start with people who live in the house with you.
- Research and list what you can do with your local church family and spend time with them
- When you watch TV or videos together, look at families. What makes them families? Can you tell if characters in TV shows are part of God's family? How?
- Read in the Bible (Mark chapter 3 verses 31-35) what Jesus said about his family?

Family Prayer

- Set some time aside to pray as a family
- You will need:
 - A central focus with a cloth,
 - A cross, a bowl of water and a candle.

We gather as a family to recall the meaning of our Baptism.

We light the candle as a symbol of Christ who is our Light, our Way for living.

Water was used at our Baptism where we were baptized in the name of God the Father, the Son and the Holy Spirit.

(By the parents) As a symbol of our baptism, we will now bless you with water with the sign of the cross on the forehead +

(Then the children bless their parents)

We now pray silently for a moment:

For those preparing for Baptism

All: that they may live a new life in Christ

For all the baptised

All: that they may live a new life in Christ

For all parents and children

All: that they may live a new life in Christ

For all who are thinking about baptism

All: that they may live a new life in Christ

We close our eyes and pray:

God of Jesus Christ, Light of the world and of our hearts. Bless us all that we may live with faith, hope and love. Amen.

¹⁸ I try to count your thoughts, but they outnumber the grains of sand on the beach.


And when I awake, I will find you nearby.
