How To Use This Workbook

Drawn into the Joy of the Gospel: Formation in the Archdiocese of Adelaide is our diocesan statement which guides the formation of leaders for mission and ministry as well as lifelong faith formation for those in parishes, schools, communities and agencies in the Archdiocese of Adelaide.

This workbook is intended to assist individuals and teams who have responsibility for the areas of formation assess the current formation offerings in the parish, school or community, based on the vision presented in *Drawn into the Joy of the Gospel*.

Readers are encouraged to read *Drawn into the Joy of the Gospel* before using the workbook, and then read through each section with the corresponding sections of the workbook.

Workbook 2 continues from *Workbook 1* and is designed to assist parishes, schools and communities to consider the current realities and possibilities for formation within their own context.

Drawn into the Joy of the Gospel was developed out of the recommendations of the 2021 Adelaide Diocesan Assembly. An overwhelming number of the Assembly's 255 recommendations pertained to formation in one way or another. In 2022 a diocesan focus group was created to study the recommendations and develop initial responses. Through this process, Drawn into the Joy of the Gospel was born. The focus group provided advice to the content and direction. Several theologians and practitioners including local parish, school and community leaders were also consulted and their feedback incorporated into the final document.

1: Introduction

(READ THE SECTION: **Page 5** of Drawn into the Joy of the Gospel)

REVIEW KEY CONCEPTS



Joy, Personal encounter and Missionary Discipleship

- Joy is a gift from God. The joy of the Gospel flows from a personal encounter with Jesus. This is a joy to be shared.
- Disciples are transformed by God's tenderness and mercy. Disciples have an endless desire to show mercy they are missionary disciples:
 - > Know God's loves as the fundamental truth of their lives, history and all of creation.
 - > Speak of this truth.
 - > Seek to be agents of mercy.

Community

- · A personal encounter with Jesus Christ connects with the church community.
- · No one is alone in faith. Communities nurture our faith.
 - > Domestic Church (household/family)
 - > Friendships
 - > Parishes and communities
 - > Catholic Schools

Purpose of Formation

- Faith formation provides opportunities that draw Catholics into a closer encounter with Jesus Christ, and thus ensure that we are "permanently in a state of mission."
- Formation for ministry ensure that those in positions of pastoral leadership and ministry encounter Jesus Christ so that they can be ministers of the joy of the gospel.

2. When designing formation opportunities, how might the authentic joy of the gospel be conveyed by leaders, teachers, catechists, and other ministers?
3. What key concepts from the introduction, are important for people in your audience(s) to understand or experience? (e.g. joy, mercy, discipleship, mission, encounter with Jesus, etc.).
4. How might these concepts be incorporated into your formation offerings in a way that help people in your audience(s) to experience and understand them?



2: Renewal in the Church

(READ THE SECTION: **Page 6** of Drawn into the Joy of the Gospel)

REVIEW KEY CONCEPTS



Structures

- The church is "first and foremost a people advancing on its pilgrim way towards God."
- Structures and institutions are needed to support the people.
- Structures are in constant need of renewal which is led by the Holy Spirit.

Spirit-led Renewal

- Expressing the deepest truth of the gospel in creative ways which make sense in the context of the times and culture.
- Deepening appreciation of scripture and the tradition of faith.
 - > Scripture: the privileged vehicle through which God speaks to humanity; the word of God.
 - > Tradition: The process of handing on the life and practice of the church, and the content of the church's belief all that the church is and believes.

Synodality

- Synodality is important. A synodal church engages in shared discernment, listening and walking together.
- The ongoing formation of all people in the church must foster a synodal conversion.

REVIEW KEY CONCEPTS



Mission and Evangelisation

- Parishes and Communities seek to be agents of joy. They must be outward-facing or mission-oriented.
- · Parishes and communities are:
 - > diverse.
 - > going to the outskirts,
 - > in touch with the whole neighborhood
 - > inclusive and open
- Evangelisation: parishes and communities proclaim the gospel in ways that respond to the searching hearts of their neighbors.

Parish and Community Life

- · Centrality of the celebration of the Eucharist
- Homilies
- · Celebration of all of the sacraments
- · Parish Activities and groups foster the faith of the community
 - > Development of biblical and theological literacy

SUGGESTED TASKS



- Explore possibilities for developing the ongoing, lifelong formation for all ages and life stages in your parish / community / school / agency (e.g. see www.lifelongfaith.com for research, strategies and ideas for designing formation).
- Use the assessment tools in appendices B to D to develop a clear picture of the formation strategies and opportunities already present and possible in your context.
- · Develop a community profile (if you don't already have one) to build a comprehensive understanding of the people and groups in your community, their various needs and trend in order to develop effective strategies for formation.

4: Formation for Pastoral Ministry

(READ THE SECTION: Pages 8 - 14 of Drawn into the Joy of the Gospel)

REVIEW KEY CONCEPTS



- · Pastoral Ministry supports the fostering of missionary discipleship
- The Archbishop is the chief pastoral minister of the Archbishop is the chief pastoral ministers in a variety of contexts in parishes, schools, communities and diocesan agencies.
- Pastoral ministers need initial and ongoing formation. Some formation is particular to the ministry role and context, while there may be areas of formation that could be shared.

DESIGN QUESTIONS



- 1. What formation opportunities in pastoral ministry and leadership are particular to your context?
- 2. Are there opportunities for shared formation for pastoral ministry and leadership with other groups named in this section? If yes, what could be shared and how might this be achieved?
- 3. How are new people discerned or called into ministry and leadership within your context? What can you do to recognise the gifts of others and call them into opportunities for ministry and leadership?

SUGGESTED TASKS



- · Audit the various leadership and pastoral ministry roles in your parish, community and school using the tool in Appendix C. From here, develop a plan to address the gaps in leadership and ministry formation in your context. What can you do locally? What resources or support is needed from larger entities (Archdiocese, CESA, Australian Catholic Bishops Conference, Religious Congregation, etc.)?
- · Make a commitment to ongoing formation in pastoral ministry and leadership for yourself and those in your care.
- · Develop a plan for recruitment and succession planning which includes formation for pastoral leadership within your ministry context.

4.1: Educators and School Leaders

(READ THE SECTION: **Page 9** of Drawn into the Joy of the Gospel)

REVIEW KEY CONCEPTS



- · Catholic schools are integral to the life of the community in SA, whose mission is to education children for society and in faith.
- · Formation in schools refers to students, parents, families as well as teachers and school leaders.
- · Catholic schools:
 - > Bear witness
 - > cultivate knowledge
 - > foster relationships of dialogue.
 - > Teachers and schools leaders need formation in biblical and theological literacy which leads to deeper faith and spiritual expression.

DESIGN QUESTIONS



- 1. How are educators and schools leaders encouraged to seek initial and ongoing formation, both personally and in their pastoral role?
- 2. What obstacles currently prevent the pastoral formation of educators and school leaders?
- 3. What opportunities already exist that could be leveraged to support the ongoing formation of educators and school leaders (e.g. staff meetings, reflection days, professional development, etc.)
- 4. How does fostering relationships of dialogue help us discover and engage with community needs?
- 5. Where are there opportunities for embedding spiritual knowing in a learning community?

4.2: Lay Diocesan Leaders, **Chaplains and Pastoral** Associates

(READ THE SECTION: **Page 12** of Drawn into the Joy of the Gospel)

REVIEW KEY CONCEPTS



- · Lay pastoral ministry, in its many forms, is a strong feature of life in the Archdiocese of Adelaide.
- Formation for lay pastoral ministry address four key areas:
 - > Human formation
 - > Spiritual Formation
 - > Intellectual Formation
 - > Pastoral Formation

DESIGN QUESTIONS



- 1. How does formation for lay pastoral ministers differ from training and formation for other 'occasional' ministries or volunteer roles (e.g. extraordinary ministers of the Eucharist, sacristans, readers, leaders of children's liturgy of the word, faith formation leaders, etc.)?
- 2. What competencies and capabilities are required for various roles and levels of lay pastoral ministry?
- 3. What formational experiences can be made available to adequately prepare lay leaders for pastoral ministry?
- 4. How does experience in leadership and service in ministry contribute to ongoing formation?
- 5. What formal and informal opportunities are possible for ongoing formation of lay pastoral ministers?

SUGGESTED TASKS

4.3: Consecrated Religious Women and Men

(READ THE SECTION: **Page 13** of Drawn into the Joy of the Gospel)

REVIEW KEY CONCEPTS



- Since the Second Vatican Council, consecrated religious women and men have undergone significant renew of charism and formation for vocation and mission.
- Pope John Paul II's Vita Consecrata identifies four areas of ongoing formation for religious life:
 - > Personal formation
 - > Apostolic formation
 - > Cultural formation
 - > Charism formation
- Pope Francis emphasized the prophetic role of religious to the world.

DESIGN QUESTIONS



- 1. What initial formation is required for those in discernment or in the early years of consecrated religious life?
- 2. How does life in a religious community contribute to the ongoing formation of individuals, including the discernment of gifts for ministry?
- 3. What opportunities exist for deeper theological, scriptural, and pastoral study and formation are available to members of your religious order?
- 4. In what ways do consecrated religious women and men, and the religious community, contribute to the formation of others in the wider community and society? What else is possible?

4.4: Deacons and Priests

(READ THE SECTION: **Page 14** of Drawn into the Joy of the Gospel)

REVIEW KEY CONCEPTS



DEACONS

- The diaconate was a reality in the Early Church and was restored at Vatican II.
- · Diaconate formation, both initial and ongoing, should address the threefold dimensions of the vocation:
 - > Ministry of service
 - > Ministry of the word
 - > Ministry of the altar

PRIESTS

- · Priests are integral leaders and ministers in the Catholic community.
- Priests, gathered around the bishop, are ministers of:

> Memory

- » The pascal Mystery
- » Homilies preaching the gospel is the first task of priests
- » Demonstration of Christ's love for others

> Communion

- » The pascal Mystery
- » Homilies preaching the gospel is the first task of priests
- » Demonstration of Christ's love for others
- Priests provide formation to their parishioners
- Priests are in need of ongoing formation:
 - > Growth in knowledge and love of God through prayer
 - > Study of scripture and theology
 - > Other disciplines as needed for the parish and diocese

DESIGN QUESTIONS

1. What aspects of formation for holy orders is conducted alongside of lay women and men?
2. What possibilities exist for collaborative formation of aspirant deacons and seminaries with lay women and men? What elements of initial formation need to be separate?
3. How do aspirant deacons and seminarians contribute to the faith formation of parishes, communities and schools? How do these community contribute to the pastoral formation of those seeking to be ordained?
4. What are the ongoing formational and skills-based needs for priests and deacons post-ordination?
5. What barriers prevent ordained deacons and priests from participating in ongoing formation for ministry?
6. How does experience in active ordained ministry continue to be formational for priests and deacons? What could deepen this?

15: Drawn into the Joy of the Gospel

REVIEW KEY CONCEPTS



- · Formation of the whole people of God is integral to the life of the Archdiocese of Adelaide: it is fundamental to our being drawn into the joy of the gospel.
- Formation, in a diverse and holistic approach, lead us to further embrace the tenderness of God.
- Embracing God's tenderness will lead us to an endless desire to show mercy, seeking to transform our parish and neighbors.
 - > Formation in faith is an ongoing, life-long task for the whole people of God parishes and communities, and all who serve them as ministers in the church
