'Being Church Together' Workshop Summary

A new document has been developed as a collaboration between Catholic Education SA and the Office for Renewing Parishes focussing on parish—school relationships. A great opportunity was given to Pastoral Associates and APRIMs to meet together and unpack the draft document entitled 'Being Church Together: A Theology, Vision and Guiding Principles for the Parish—School relationship'. It was a chance for people to share successes and acknowledge challenges experienced in their own context as well as looking at the principles of the vision and discussing examples of good practice occurring in our Archdiocese. This document is available for use and consultation with each local parish-school group to strengthen relationships through meaningful dialogue and reflecting on our shared mission in faith formation of children and families.

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THE GOSPEL OF MARK

The book of Mark is a Gospel that includes narrative history, sermons and parables. Mark's Gospel is brief (nearly half as long as Luke) and focuses more on the mighty works that Jesus performed rather than the content of Jesus' teaching. More than half of Mark's gospel is dedicated to giving an account of the extraordinary deeds that Jesus performed when healing the sick.

Mark's stories are not in chronological order but rather gives a quick, accurate view of Jesus.

This Gospel emphasises the miracles (27 total) considerably more than any of the other Gospels. The key word in Mark is "*immediately*" which is used to present a quick, urgent, direct message about who Jesus is and what he did.

Mark is the shortest of the synoptic gospels and was written about 64 A.D. The key personalities of this book are Jesus Christ, the disciples, Jewish religious leaders, Pilate and John the Baptist.

It was written by John Mark who was one of the missionaries who accompanied Paul and Barnabas on their mission trips.

This Gospel emphasises two important characteristics of Jesus Christ: His authority as the Son of God and

His compassionate service to people (particularly in miracles)

The purpose of the Gospel of Mark is to show that Jesus is the Messiah, the Son of God who was sent to suffer and to serve in order to rescue and restore humanity. It is an exciting account of the Son of God that could speak to the Jews and the gentiles of Mark's day.

Quick outline of Mark:

Jesus' authority among the people (Mk 1:1–8:13) Jesus' mission and nature revealed to the disciples (Mk 8:14–10:52) Jesus is tested and crucified (Mk 11–15) Jesus' resurrection and commission (Mk 16)



Mark opens with a quick overview of what the book is about: "the Gospel of Jesus Christ, the Son of God" (Mk 1:1). Every passage in Mark, every miracle, every conversation, every deed, points back to Jesus' authority as the Son of God. The 16 chapters of the Gospel of Mark can be divided into two parts, 8 chapters each. In the first 8 chapters Jesus is essentially traveling north and preaching until chapter 8. In Chapter 8, Jesus is in the city of Caesarea Philippi where He asks His disciples, "Who do people say that I am?" (vs. 27). Peter replies, "You are the Christ". Throughout the last 8 chapters, Jesus is travelling south, back to Jerusalem; all the way to Calvary's Cross.

Gospel of Mark: What is the Significance?

In this Gospel, Jesus gives people perfect instructions for how God desires us to live, respond through challenging circumstances and make choices regarding our future for eternity. A few examples of these include having faith (Mark 2:5), replacing fear with trust

(Mark 4:40), believing in the power of God (Mark 5:36), following Christ (Mark 8:35), understanding God's will (Mark 9:35), for the Gospel

John Mark was present at the wedding at Cana n Galliee (John 2:1-11). Church tradition identified young Mark as one of the seventy disciples sent out to proclaim the Gospel (Luke 10:1-17).

and sacrifices (Mark 10:21). Every word spoken and written in this Gospel can be applied to life in a practical manner.




JESUS IN MARK'S GOSPEL

The Gospel of Mark focuses on nine characteristics of Jesus. Primarily, Jesus is a leader who teaches and succeeds through surrenders to the will of God. In doing so, he suffers and perseveres. Importantly, his actions and words show that he does not fit the typical image of a religious teacher. He is independent and autonomous. Mark also chose particular stories about Jesus that show him to be patient and a man of action who holds authority. Mark shows us the human side of Jesus.

- 1. **Jesus is not self-promoting. (Mark 1:11)** In beginning his ministry, Jesus is clear that there is a greater power at work. The fact that he places himself under the care of John the Baptist for baptism shows that Jesus is going to teach his followers submission does not mean weakness. Jesus models what real service is all about by not promoting himself but allowing John to be in charge.
- 2. Jesus is obedient to the Holy Spirit. (Mark 1:12-13) After Jesus' baptism, Mark writes that "at once the Spirit sent him out into the wilderness and he was in the wilderness forty days, being tempted by Satan. He was with the wild animals, and angels attended him." Jesus is tested in every temptation known to humanity but remains true to the Holy Spirit.
- 3. Jesus casts a vision, with clarity, simplicity, and directness. (Mark 1:15) One of the most powerful components of Jesus' ministry is his ability to be simple, clear and direct. Jesus shows this in his preaching and teaching. His ability to tell the truth through a simple parable is the foundation of all he does. These parables have a purpose that is greater than the story.
- **4. Jesus is a strategic team builder. (Mark 1:17)** When Jesus calls the first four disciples, who are fishermen to follow him he says, "Come, follow me," Jesus said, "and I will send you out to fish for people." When Jesus begins the process of calling his disciples to follow him, he deliberately starts with men who have something in common.
- **5. Jesus is a relationship builder. (Mark 1:19)** Jesus recruits his disciples by finding those who share common traits and values and shows the power of Jesus to merge diverse people. Jesus is all about building relationships.
- **6. Jesus expresses control and authority as a leader when needed.** (Mark 1:23-25) Never doubt that Jesus has the authority and expresses firm control when needed.
- 7. Jesus engages crisis head-on. (Mark 1:30-31) Often a crisis will cripple many people. However, Jesus takes a crisis head-on. Jesus is a strong leader who takes on what others fear.
- **8. Jesus practices daily prayer. (Mark 1:35)** Jesus prays every day. The daily practice of prayer empowers us to be better people.
- 9. Jesus is all about empowering others. (Mark 1:40-45) Jesus' entire ministry focuses on the empowerment of others.

These 9 characteristics of Jesus show his style of leadership that is steeped in serving others and developing the gifts and skills of his disciples. Jesus Christ is the greatest of all leaders!


Jesus Teaches in Parables
