



THE STATIONS OF THE CROSS

WHAT ARE THE STATIONS OF THE CROSS?:

The Stations of the Cross (sometimes also called the "Way of the Cross" or Via Crucis, in Latin) are a traditional devotion tracing the events on the way to Christ's crucifixion. The devotion has its roots in the practice of pilgrimage to Jerusalem, especially to sites along the way to the cross. In the fifteenth century, as it became difficult for Christians to visit Jerusalem, the Franciscans began to erect outdoor shrines in Europe to recall these holy places, and in later centuries the devotion took root throughout the entire Church.

Traditionally, there are fourteen stations:

- 1. Jesus is condemned to death
- 2. Jesus takes up his cross
- 3. Jesus falls the first time
- 4. Jesus meets his mother
- 5. Simon of Cyrene helps Jesus carry his cross
- 6. Veronica wipes the face of Jesus
- 7. Jesus falls the second time
- 8. Jesus meets the weeping women of Jerusalem
- 9. Jesus falls the third time
- 10. Jesus is stripped of his garments
- 11. Jesus is nailed to the cross
- 12. Jesus dies on the cross
- 13. Jesus is taken down from the cross
- 14. Jesus is laid in the tomb



Not all of these stations are found in scripture; they are based on extra-biblical traditions surrounding the passion of Christ. (In 1991 Pope John Paul II released a "Scriptural Way of the Cross" which closely follows the gospel accounts of the passion.) Traditional prayers that accompany this devotion allow us to meditate on the mystery of Christ's death on the cross.

VIRTUAL STATIONS OF THE CROSS

This method offers the traditional devotion in a virtual way to help both children and adults reflect on the mystery of Jesus' death and what it still means to us today.

The Stations of the Cross is a devotion following the events leading to Jesus' crucifixion. Prayers accompanying it allow time to reflect on the mystery of his death. The Stations of the Cross may be done at any time, but is commonly a part of Lenten spiritual practice, specifically on Good Friday. Busted Halo has created a series of virtual stations designed for personal devotion. These stations relate to Jesus' teachings about the Kingdom of God and the reason his vision of this Kingdom led to his death. Find a quiet place to watch these stations, and as you do the devotions be open to how God is speaking to you through the Stations of the Cross.

THE WAY OF THE CROSS

HOW TO PRAY THE STATIONS OF THE CROSS

The Stations of the Cross, also known as the Way of the Cross, or Via Dolorosa (Sorrowful Way), is a popular Lenten devotion. Many parishes join as a group and pray the Stations of the Cross on the Fridays of Lent to call to mind the Passion of Christ, the journey Jesus took from his condemnation to his death.

THE HISTORY OF THE STATIONS OF THE CROSS

The Way of the Cross has its origins with the Blessed Mother. It is believed that Mary pondered all the mysteries of Christ in her heart, retraced the steps of her Son's Passion and the significant events that happened along the way, keeping in her memory and for the memory of the Church, the sacred path on which the Son of God walked.

Later in her life, when she was no longer living near Jerusalem, it is said that Mary continued this devotional practice by creating a similar outdoor path near her home with stone markers, along which she would walk, pray, and meditate on those things that happened to her son on his Sorrowful Way.

This devotional walk, known as the Stations of the Cross, became one of the most popular and useful ways for the devout to meditate on Christ's Passion. From the 18th century, by Papal decree, all Catholic churches were permitted to erect the Stations of the Cross in the sanctuary, with fourteen in total.



THE SEVEN LAST WORDS OF CHRIST: As Jesus was dying on the

cross, he said some very important words. We call these "The Seven Last Words of Christ."

Luke 23:34 (Father, forgive them, they know not what they do.)

Luke 23:43 (Amen, I say to you, today you will be with me in Paradise)

John 19:26-27 (Woman [Mary], behold your son. [to the disciple] Behold your mother.)

Matthew 27:46 and/or Mark 15:34 (My God, my God, why have you forsaken me?)

John 19:28 (I thirst)

John 19:30 (It is finished.)

Luke 23:46 (Father, into your hands, I commend my spirit.)

JESUS' JOURNEY TO THE CROSS Symbols or pictures of Jesus journeying to Calvary. We unite ourselves with Jesus in his journey and we reflect on the ways in our life that Jesus has journeyed with us. Traditionally, our churches display the fourteen stations.





Place the crucifix in a central spot where it can be obviously seen, even a child's drawing of Jesus's death for us can be a powerful stirring reminder of God's love.

WATER: Place a bowl of water in a central spot as a reminder of our journey to the font of baptism for the renewal of commitment and life in Christ.

Pray over the bowl saying: "Lord, may this water remind us of our baptism and be a blessing for our home. Bless us as we sign the cross each day".



JOURNEY TO CALVARY



Traditionally, there are fourteen stations of the Cross which we take time to journey with Jesus after he was condemned to death. Some churches have a variant to the traditional stations starting Jesus in the Garden of Gethsemane and ending with the Burial of Jesus.

Churches usually have a community prayer reflection of the Journey of Jesus to Calvary scheduled each week during Lent and on the morning of Good Friday. We are all invited, also, to a personal journey to the cross at anytime either in

the Church or with our personal pictures or booklet at home.

Some ideas:

- Google the various images of the 14 stations and create your own set and place in an organza bag. Pray and reflect on these or take a different one each day and Journey with Jesus.
- Take a different Scriptural Station of the Cross with the children at different times (outlined below), look up the scripture quote and make a response to the reflective reading either through a prayer or drawing or shared reflection on life.

Scriptural Stations of the Cross

1st Jesus on the Mount of Olives (Luke 22:39-46).
2nd Jesus is betrayed by Judas and arrested (Luke 22:47-48).
3rd Jesus is condemned by the Sanhedrin (Luke 22:66-71).
4th Peter denies Jesus (Luke 22:54-62).
5th Jesus is judged by Pontius Pilate (Luke 23:13-25).
6th Jesus is scourged and crowned with thorns (Luke 22:63-65).
7th Jesus takes up His cross (John 19:17).
8th Simon of Cyrene helps Jesus carry His cross (Luke 23:26).
9th Jesus meets the women of Jerusalem (Luke 23:27-31).
10th Jesus is crucified (Luke 23:33-47).
11th Jesus promises His kingdom to the believing thief (Luke 23:43).
12th Jesus dies on the cross (Luke 23:44-46).
14th Jesus is laid in the tomb (Luke 23:50-54).


- Allow Jesus to journey with you during any of the 'stations' of your life.



Lent & Meditations







This book offers a range of activities, prayers, and rituals to involve your entire family in the Lenten celebration. To think about spiritual values while having fun with one another.


