CHILDREN'S MINISTRY

OUR MISSION AS CATECHISTS • Jesus was asked to say who John the Baptist was and he quoted from the book of Malachi: "See, I am sending my messenger to prepare the way before me" (Mal 3:1). Put your name to replace the words 'my messenger' and you will see that you share the great priviledge of preparing the hearts of children to be open to the Lord.

- We prepare the children we work with to be open to God's embrace so that Christ's image may be shaped in them.
- The formation of Christ in the hearts of children is the aim of catechesis, but God forms them through us, messengers.

- We help prepare the hearts of children we work with by sharing our own faith life as well as the faith of others through various activities which allow children to share their faith experiences also.
- We are called to prepare children's minds as well as their hearts and so we makes sense of the gospel by relating to their own life experiences.
- We are mediators whereby we facilitate communication between the children and the mystery of God.

Ask yourself...

- How do I experience my mission as a messenger of God to the children I work with?
- How do I see my role as a catechist? How do I achieve my goal as a catechist?



FEAST OF THE ASSUMPTION

This feast is traditionally observed on August 15th to celebrate Mary being taken from this life by her natural death and assumed body and soul into heaven . Only since 1950 has this teaching been a dogma of the church, proclaimed by



Pope XII to be infallible and is seen as a holy d a y o f obligation. This event of the assumption is a source of great hope for us as we strive to be faithful like Mary and gain the grace of eternal life.

ACTIVITIES

- Fold a piece of A4 paper into thirds. Write LOVE on the top of 1st panel, HOPE on the 2nd, JOY on the 3rd. Illustrate each panel and take it home
- Write prayers of intercessions to share with the group or at mass
- Pray The Hail Mary
- Pray The Rosary

- Discuss the qualities and roles of mothers and cut out magazine pictures to put onto a poster

- Set up a sacred space with a statue of Mary, blue cloth, flowers and candles
- Discuss the significance of this feast
- Brainstorm the many roles of Mary as a mother and in the church



MARY MACKILLOP PLACE, VICTORIA SQUARE, ADELAIDE


This beautiful statue sculpted by Judith Rolevink is found in Mary MacKillop Place and is a wonderful tribute to Mary MacKillop and to the sisters of St. Joseph of the Sacred Heart. Holding the hands of two children young Mary MacKillop seems to move with determination and a sense of purpose, she is a woman on a mission. Her mission is a vision of care and education for all Australians, particularly the poor. The indigenous young boy is a tribute to Mary's determination that all people deserve human dignity and justice. The religious habit of Mary MacKillop speaks of religious community, as Mary does not undertake this mission alone. The crucifix tucked into her belt is a reminder of the many forms of suffering that Mary MacKillop will endure throughout her life and of her devotion to the cross that will cause her to later be known as, 'Mary of the cross'. Her rosary beads speak of her strong faith in God, devotion to prayer that sustained her and to the Church that she loved so deeply. The National eConference held to close the year of St Paul was followed with keen interest throughout the country as well as in multi-denominational and international centres in USA, Canada and the Philippines. It marked a milestone in the history of the Australian Church as the Broken Bay Institute launched its first-ever video-conference, live-streamed from Sydney.

At the Catholic Education Office conference centre, 20 of us gathered on Tuesday 30 June to follow the proceedings via video. I was there, partly out of curiosity and partly out of interest to update my knowledge of St Paul after having



st there, partly out of curiosity and partly out of interest to update my knowledge of St Paul after having studied him in my earlier theological studies. Fr Brendan Byrne SJ, Sr Michele Connolly RSJ and Fr Richard Leonard, respected faculty from the Broken Bay Institute, took turns to deliver half-hourly inputs on various aspects of Pauline theology.

In between their talks, we had the chance to discuss among ourselves in table groups and then to interact with the speakers online by asking questions, offering feedback and sharing observations with the international audience. These comments were acknowledged publicly and responded to at the concluding Question and Answer session.

As the last speaker, Fr Richard Leonard affirmed, the use of current technology and media to share on St Paul is the way of evangelisation and inculturation today. It makes the idea of a universal Church so real and tangible.

For me, a newcomer in Australian society, it was a wonderful opportunity to see the Australian Church pioneering this inclusive approach to mass learning and shared wisdom.

ORDINARY TIME

A Season to Enjoy the Familiar

In Ordinary Time we have the opportunity to enjoy the familiar, to be at peace and to let things remain as they are for a while. 'Abide with me' and 'remain in my love', are the messages we are to take heart in Ordinary Time. The idea of having space for our spirit to dwell in peace

and to rest is attractive. It is also important that our contemplative side is given a chance to develop and deepen. The very nature of Ordinary Time calls us to be present in whatever environment we are in and to learn the lessons of this place.

Ordinary Time provides us with the comfort and also the challenge of removing our persona, the mask and the make-up. We are invited to take off our shoes, slip out of the role-relating postures and to be ourselves. Here, in our ordinary space, we enjoy our many relationships, what it means to be present in the ordinary circumstances of people's lives. It calls us to have our feet planted on the ground, our sleeves rolled up and the kettle on the boil. As we all know, there is unlimited scope to do the ordinary extraordinarily well.

Being With Jesus

Mary MacKillop spent countless hours in prayer contemplating the events of Jesus' life. She enjoyed the familiar encounter with Jesus her daily companion in all the seasons of her life.



When Jesus said, 'I am the bread of Life, and whoever comes to me will not hunger', he commanded that the disciples go and do as he did, in memory of him. This is every Christians task, to be bread for others.

- Reflect on the hunger of our world. Include the literal hunger of those who are without and then go beyond this to name the symbolic hungers.
- Try to unmask the hunger behind violence, fraud, pride. Consider your own hungers and the symptoms that develop in your attitudes and behaviours.
- Speak to Jesus about any experience in which someone has been 'bread for you'. It what ways did this affect you? In what ways will you be nourishment for another's hunger?
